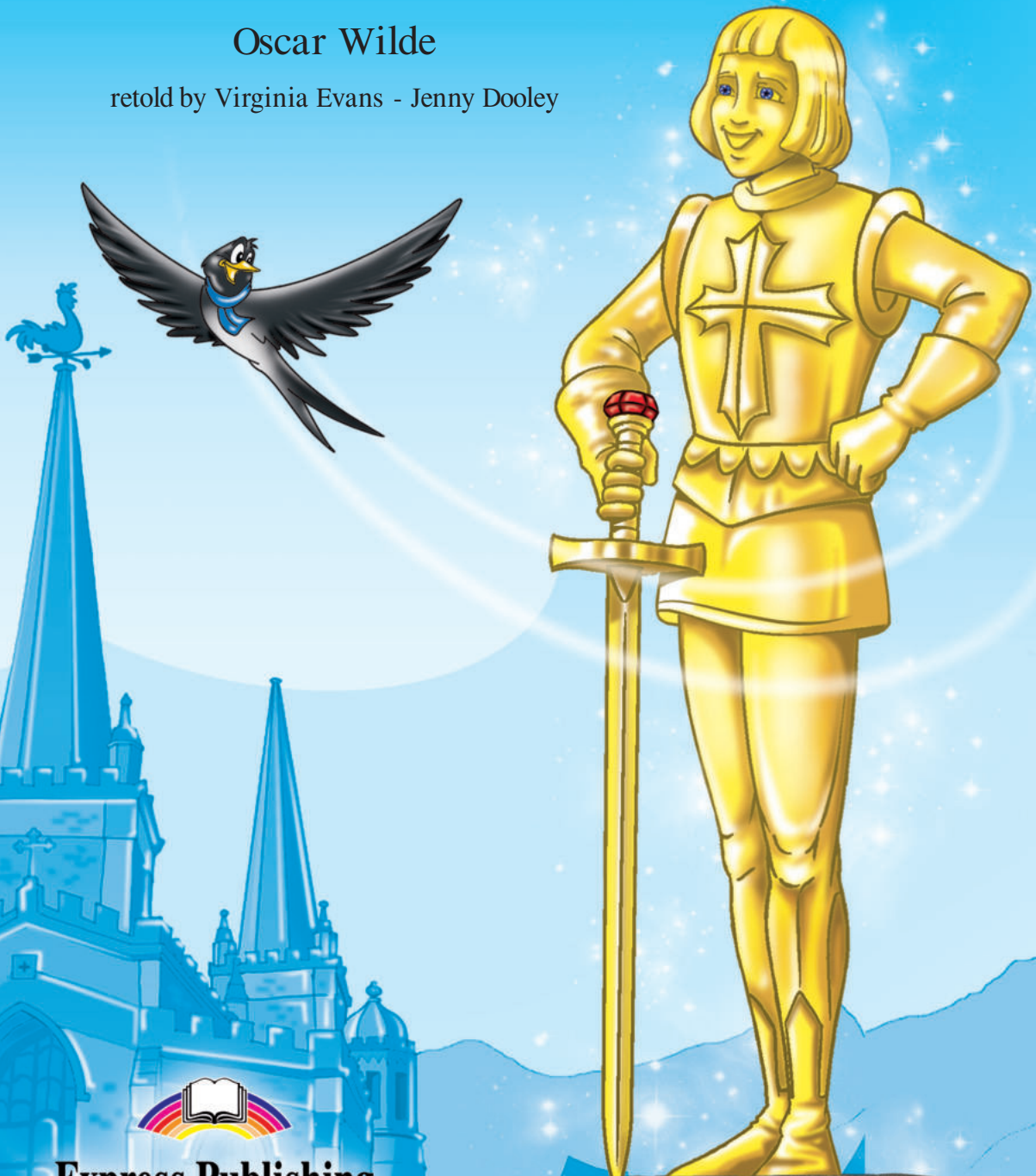

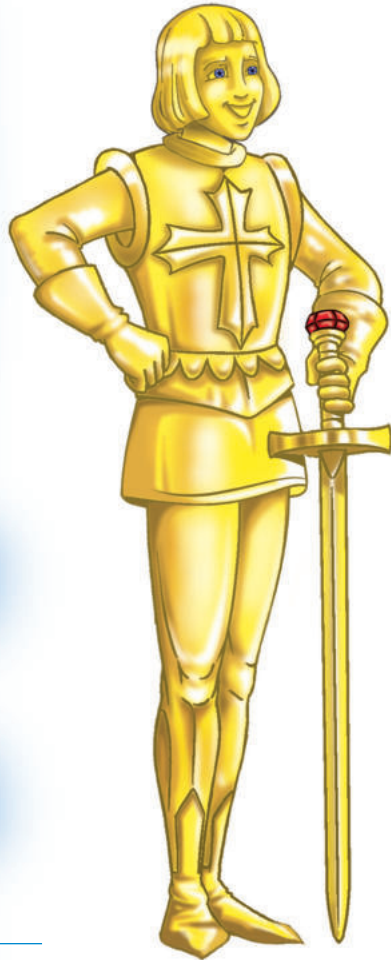

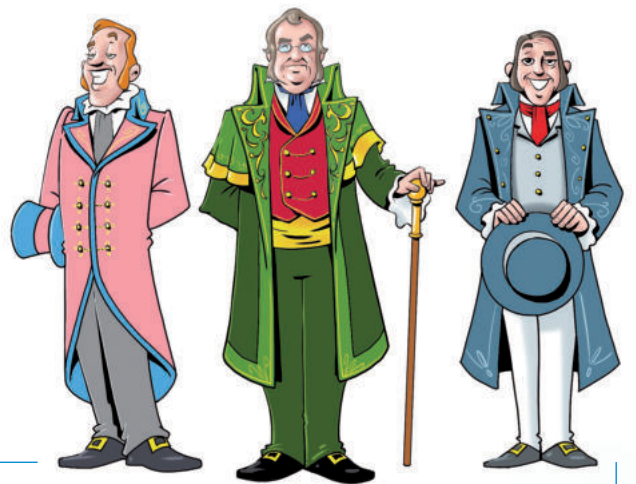
The Happy Prince

... is a child who sells matches in the streets of the city. She sells them to get money for her family so that they can buy food to eat.

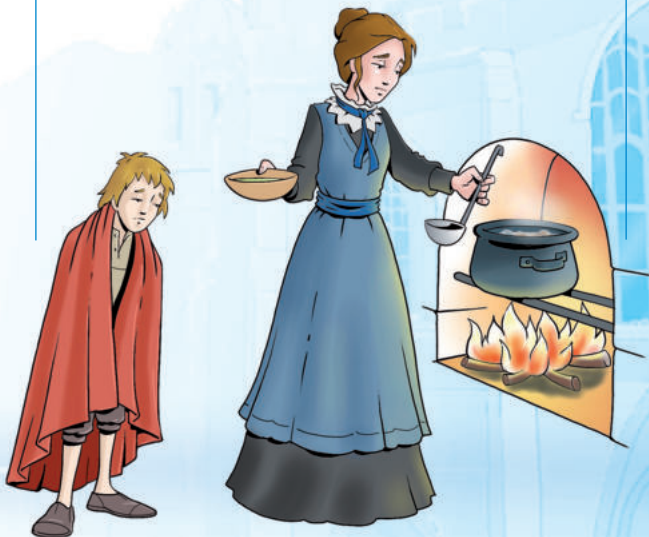


The writer

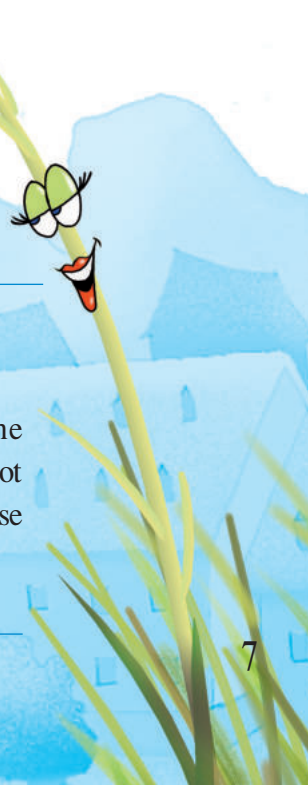
The poor woman

The other Town Councillor thought for a moment.

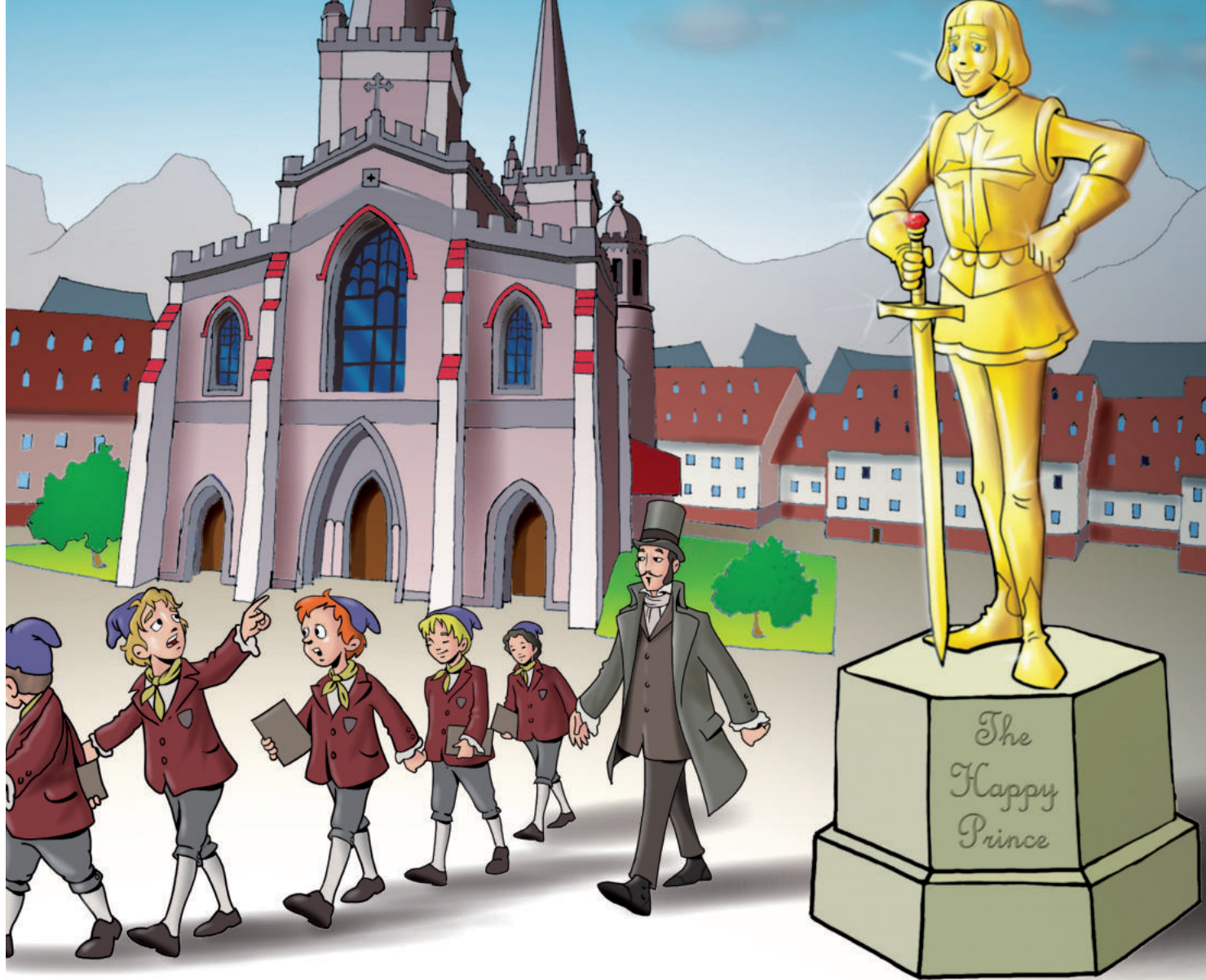
“That’s true, but he is not as useful.”

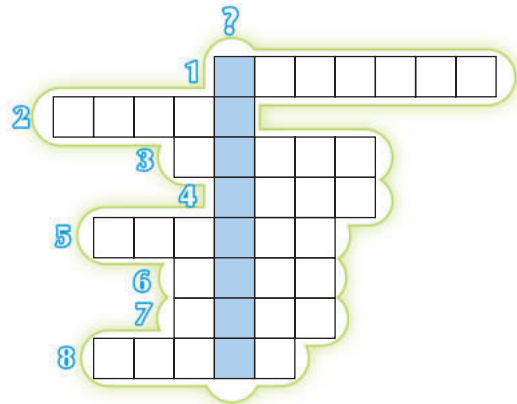
