Robert Louis Stevenson



Robert Louis Stevenson was born in Scotland in 1850. He wrote many novels, poems and travel books. Stevenson suffered from ill health all his life. He often travelled to warmer climates to escape the cold, damp English weather. Stevenson married Fanny Osbourne in 1880 and, together with her son Lloyd, they travelled to many exotic places.

Stevenson began writing his most famous book, *Treasure Island*, in 1881. It began as a game for his stepson Lloyd and soon became a

novel in 1883. From 1884-1887 Stevenson lived in Bournemouth in the south of England. It was here that he wrote *Kidnapped*, which was published in 1886. The novel shows Stevenson's love of Scottish history. During this time, he also wrote another famous book, *The Strange Case of Dr Jekyll and Mr Hyde*.

In 1889 Stevenson and his family settled in Samoa. The weather in the South Sea Islands was good for him and his health improved, but then Stevenson died suddenly in December, 1894.

After his death, he was thought of mainly as a writer of children's stories, but in recent years he has come to be appreciated as one of the most famous adventure writers of all time.

Kidnapped

Kidnapped is a classic adventure story set in Scotland in 1751. This was a dramatic period in British history as the Scottish people were divided over who was the 'rightful' King. Many people in Scotland supported Prince Charles Edward. They were called Jacobites and were considered to be rebels by the English. Other Scotsmen were on the side of King George II and they were called Royalists. King George sent soldiers to Scotland to try and destroy the Jacobites. These soldiers were called Redcoats because of the colour of their uniforms.

Kidnapped takes place a few years after Charles Edward's army was defeated by the English. He fled to France where he lived in exile with many of his supporters. In Scotland, the Jacobites called him "The King Across the Water".

Our main characters are young David Balfour, who is a Royalist, and Alan Stewart, who is a Jacobite. Even though they do not agree on who should be king, they have many adventures together and become good friends.

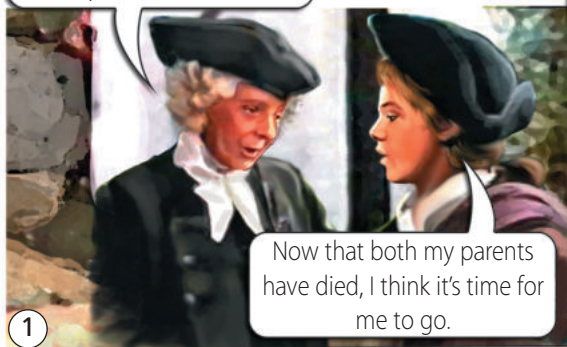

Excuse me, I'm trying to find a house. It's called The Shaws.



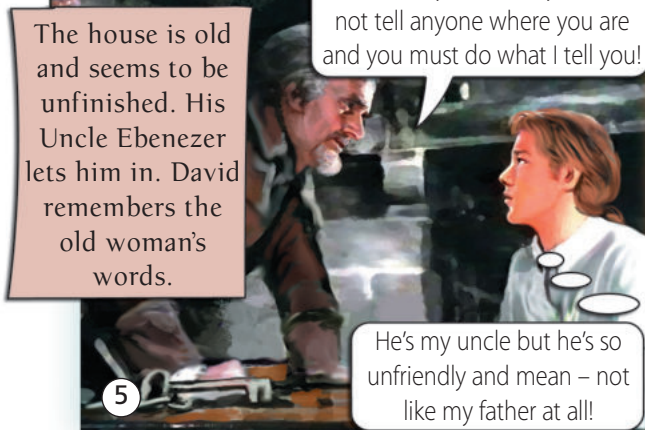
