- 5 People have been dyeing and decorating Easter eggs for a very long time. In fact, the tradition goes back to before Christianity because eggs were a symbol of new life in many ancient cultures. People used to use 5) bark, leaves, flowers and fruit to dye eggs different colours. These days, some people use food colouring, but others still use natural materials.



- - 6 The rabbit is the animal most people think of when it comes to Easter, but in some countries, other animals like a fox, cuckoo bird, cockerel, stork or chick (a baby 6)) bring children their Easter eggs and sweets.
- 7 The record for the largest Easter egg is held by the village of Tosca in Italy. The villagers created a 7,200-kilogramme 7) egg with a circumference of 19.6 metres.
