Cosplayer Poland

What is it? A cosplayer is someone who dresses up as their favourite character from comics, anime or video games. The word 'cosplay' comes from the words 'costume' and 'play' and is originally from Japanese and Korean pop culture.

Why do you like it? I like being creative and I love making my own costumes. It's also great to get together with friends and watch anime, read manga comics or listen to K-pop music.

How popular is it? Cosplay is very popular all over the world and among Polish teenagers, too. Now we even have the *Japanicon* convention that takes place in Poznań every year.


