Sir Arthur Conan Doyle

Arthur Conan Doyle was born in Edinburgh, Scotland on 22 May 1859. He studied medicine at Edinburgh University from 1876 to 1881. While at university, he published his first story, *The Mystery of Sasassa Valley*, in 1879. After graduating, he worked as a doctor, but continued to write in his spare time.

On 5 August 1885, Conan Doyle married Louise Hawkins. They were happily married for twenty-one years and had two children. In 1887, the first Sherlock Holmes story, *A Study in Scarlet*, was published. In 1891, Conan Doyle gave up his job as a doctor to work full-time as a professional writer.

Conan Doyle wrote many other books that were not about Holmes, such as the classic adventure story, *The Lost World*. However, people will always remember him for the Sherlock Holmes stories.

In 1902, he became Sir Arthur Conan Doyle. In the same year, he wrote perhaps the most famous Holmes story of all – *The Hound of the Baskervilles*.

In 1906, Conan Doyle's wife, Louise, died. A year later, he married Jean Leckie with whom he had three children. Conan Doyle became interested in other things. He was involved in a very famous case in England in the 1920s. Two young girls claimed to have seen and taken photographs of fairies. Conan Doyle wrote a book, *The Coming of the Fairies*, about the photographs, saying that he believed it was all true.

Sir Arthur Conan Doyle died on 7 July 1930 at his home in Windlesham, Sussex. He was a great writer who will always be remembered for creating the world's most famous detective.

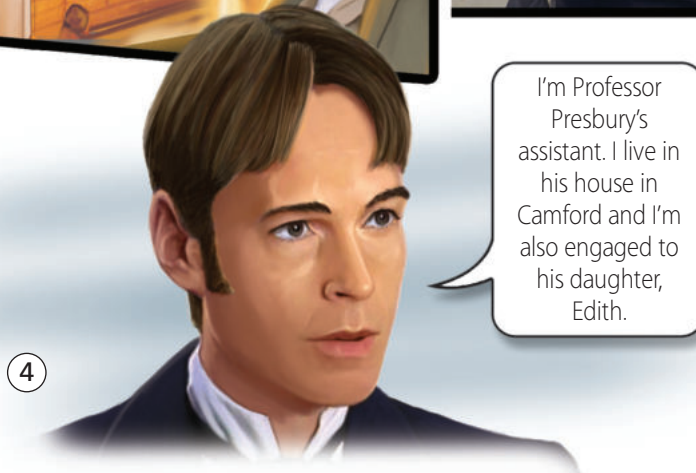
The Creeping Man

The Creeping Man is one of the most popular of Arthur Conan Doyle's stories. It was first published in 1923 in *Strand Magazine*, but later appeared in the last collection of Sherlock Holmes stories, *The Casebook of Sherlock Holmes*, in 1927.

Just like *The Hound of the Baskervilles*, *The Creeping Man* is a Sherlock Holmes case that is both strange and scary. In the later years of his life, Conan Doyle became increasingly interested in the supernatural and other strange things, and *The Creeping Man* reflects this interest. Many people think of *The Creeping Man* as a story of science fiction, very similar in many ways to *Dr Jekyll and Mr Hyde*. *The Creeping Man* has been dramatised for both television and radio.

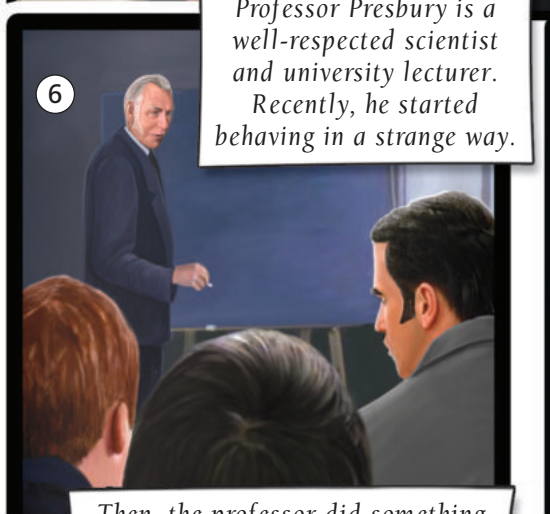
1. THE VANISHING PROFESSOR

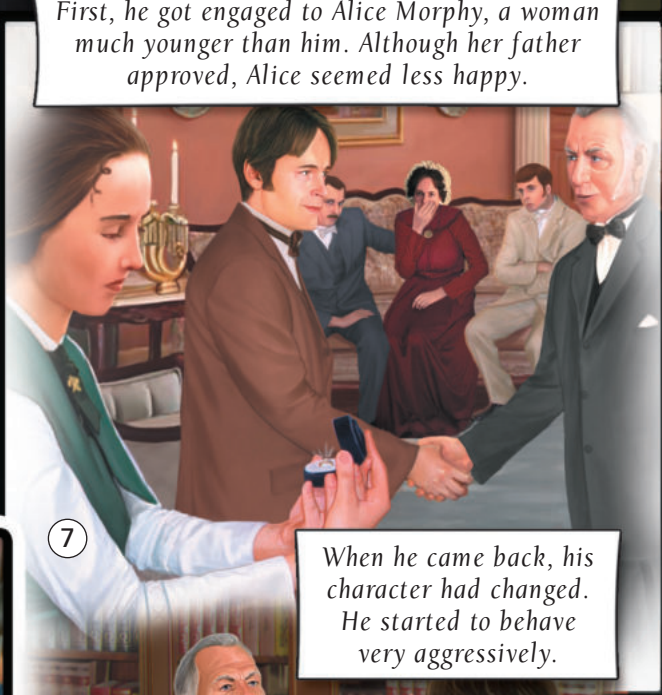
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Professor Presbury is a well-respected scientist and university lecturer. Recently, he started behaving in a strange way.



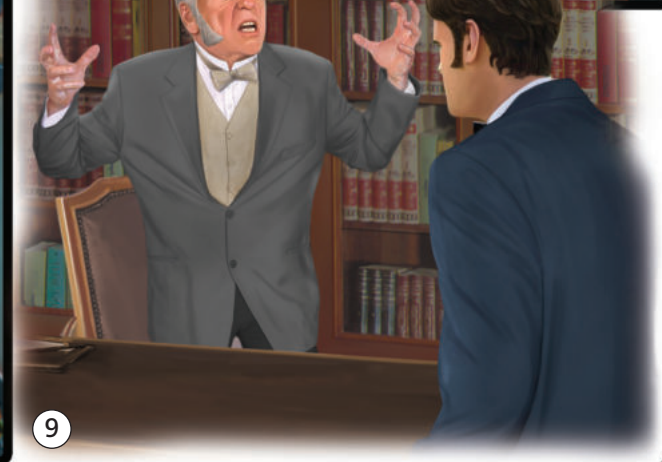
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Then, the professor did something completely out of character. He disappeared for two weeks and nobody knew where he was.
