Underwater Legend

Octopuses have been floating around for many thousands of years and are arguably one of the most well-recognized sea creatures. They can be found in all of the oceans across the world, but generally prefer warm tropical waters.

Sometimes called the "Monsters of the deep," much has been written about octopuses in various myths and legends over the years. For example, in Hawaiian mythology, the octopus is the only survivor left behind from an earlier,

alien universe. In Tahitian legend, the octopus is called *Rogo-tumu*, and is a terrifying sea demon which uses its tentacles to drag sailors down to the bottom of the ocean.

Ancient stories from the Bahamas tell of a giant sea creature called the Lusca, which can squeeze through tiny cracks and change color in a split second. The Mediterranean people also told tales of a sea god named Yamm, who had many legs and heads.
